They say a week in politics is a long time. This last week has been an extraordinary one! It started with the Education Update announcements including the surprise new online schools that just came straight out of left field! And all of this on top of the Global funding proposals. Put together, they have serious consequences for how we operate day to day in our schools.

Starting with the global funding, I remind you again, 'Go to the PUMs'. Take your teachers with you and learn all you can. Being informed is the only way you can fight for the model of funding you want to give your kids the education they deserve. I know you don't enjoy disrupting your kids' learning programmes or your parents' routines, but this in the end is important for your kids.

Then there is 'online school'! We all know priority kids are the focus of this Government and we know those kids need strong relationship building, confidence building, social skills and participation before they can engage in meaningful learning. Of all the kids at school, they are the ones who can least benefit from 'online school'.

Information technology is well embedded into our world class curriculum, which is delivered by highly qualified teaching professionals. This is so we are preparing our kids for the demands of the twenty-first century.

We have some excellent examples of using the net to connect classes of kids from isolated schools as happens through the Virtual Learning Network (VLN) Primary School. Through VLN kids in their own schools with their own fully qualified teachers can take lessons online with other kids from isolated areas.

If a school doesn't have the full complement of subject choices, students can take subjects through other online or satellite connections. It's great! There's nothing wrong with that at all. The Correspondence school or Te Kura is another source of highly qualified teachers with specialist expertise in distance learning.

So why would you want to be introducing commercial companies to compete in this well-developed space? Why would you want to invite inferior online programmes into our system which don't have to be taught by qualified, teachers? Why would we want to dilute the quality of our education system? It's a dangerous idea.

Finally if you have received a survey on wellbeing from NZCER, PLEASE do take the time to fill it out. The survey forms the evidence that we can later use to lobby for better conditions and better leadership support for you all.

MINISTRY BULLETIN

You will all have received this week's MOE Bulletin. I repeat some points from that edition for an extra reminder:

- <u>A3 Roadmap</u> This <u>A3 roadmap</u> provides information on significant areas of work occurring, which you might want to input into or be aware of. It shows key dates, opportunities to have your say and when these activities are likely to be implemented. We hope this is helpful and we'll update it on a quarterly basis and include in future bulletins.
- <u>Nominees sought for new allocation panels</u> Under the new Professional Learning and Development (PLD) system, centrally-funded PLD will be allocated regionally every school term. Communities of Learning, schools and kura will submit proposals to area allocation panels.

Your regional Director of Education will be contacting key stakeholders to discuss the setting up of regional allocation panels. These panels will reflect regional diversity and priorities.

Accessing your Provisional Funding and Staffing Notices:

How to log into the Ministry's online portal

- 1. Go to the Educational Leaders website.
- 2. Log into e-Admin.
- 3. Click on School Data Portal in the Applications section. (This link was previously named the Student Data Upload.) If you can't see the link, call the e-Admin contact centre on 04 463 8383.

How to download school notices using the Ministry's online portal:

To download your school's staffing and funding notices:

- 1. From the School Data Portal homepage, click on the 'Download' button the portal will show the list of available files.
- 2. Click the download link to the right of the relevant file a PDF will open in the browser, or the browser will offer to save the file to your computer.
- 3. Alternatively, you can right click the download link and select 'Save link/target as' to save the file directly without opening it.
- <u>New Online Curriculum Resource Launched</u> We've launched a new resource for teachers and school leaders <u>The Learning Progression Frameworks</u> (LPF). All teachers of students in years 1-10 can access this online resource.

The LPF illustrate the significant steps that year 1-10 students take as they develop their expertise in reading, writing and mathematics, spanning levels 1-5 of the New Zealand Curriculum (NZC).

The LPF builds on the NZC and it underpins the Progress and Consistency Tool (PaCT) for years 1-8 (curriculum levels 1-4), creating a powerful toolbox for planning and assessing progress. The addition of curriculum level 5 means it can bridge the gap between primary and secondary schools to more effectively support a learner pathway.

The LPF site also contains interactive professional learning and development modules. Feedback from teachers who trialed the frameworks has been positive and the majority of leaders said the modules provided solid support to drive their own professional development.

We've also launched the Learning Progression app that contains digital illustrations from PaCT reading, writing and maths frameworks for years 1-8. Year 9-10 illustrations will be added later this year. You can download the app from <u>iTunes</u> or <u>Google Play</u>.
