As I meet with you up and down the country, you tell me how stretched you are, as you try to grasp the findings of the Task Forces that have been reviewing our education system this past year. Some of you report that there is no time to engage in these extra discussions and debates because you are completely consumed in the demands of your schools and communities. I hear you! And that is why NZPF has endeavoured to capture your ideas through surveying you and through gathering the regional presidents together in Wellington for our Moot this year. The moot focused entirely on the Tomorrow's Schools Review.

The survey, the Moot and the intensive discussions of the National Executive are the three most important sources we are using to construct our submission on the recommendations of the Tomorrow's Schools Review. We hope we have captured the majority views and will share the submission with you in due course. Thanks to all of you who responded to the survey and once again, I acknowledge the effort made by the regional presidents who participated in the Moot. We have now analysed all your feedback which has proved invaluable.

Māori Education

I his week I met with the Associate Minister of Education, Hon Keivin Davis.

We discussed a range of matters related to the Tomorrow's Schools Review Report; the Rāngai Māori medium Level 1 workforce strategy; Māori students' achievement/potential; and bias and racism.

Minister Davis is well aware that the education system needs to do much more to support PLD for all schools and leaders if our Māori learners are going to reach their potential. He has been a school principal himself and understands what is needed.

I made a commitment to the Minister, that NZPF will support any plans that inspire and challenge the profession to help Māori reach their potential.

Many of you are already running excellent, culturally capable schools, and many others are seeking guidance to become excellent in cultural responsiveness. I am delighted that the new PLD priorities have 'cultural capability' right at the top of their list along with localised curriculum design. I listed the new PLD priorities in my *Principal Matters* (7) newsletter last week. Here they are again in case you missed them:

Proposed priorities as described in Māori medium

Mātauranga Māori (Te Reo Māori me te Aratakinga)

He mana tō te Mātauranga, He mana tō te Reo, He mana tō te Tangata

Marau ā-kura

He marau ā-kura he mea hāngai, e aronui ana hoki ki ngā tino hiahia o ngā ākonga, ngā whānau, ngā hapū me ngā iwi

Aromatawai

He puāwaitanga harakeke, he rito whakakī whāruarua.

He wā anō ka pua te kōrari, kei ōna pua he mīere hei ngote mā te manu.

Cultural capability

Building cultural capability so that all akonga are secure in their identity.

Local curriculum Design

Relevant and engaging local curriculum design that is truly responsive to the needs and priorities of ākonga, whānau and the community

Using information to support learning

Enrich learning in the classroom by growing aromatawai, inquiry and assessment capabilities and use of information to build on student strengths

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
