Te Akatea

Was established in the early nineties to provide a voice for Maori Leadership in education

Schools become members not individuals and membership is open to all Maori Principals with associate membership to aspiring principals and leaders.

Te Akatea practises a distributive leadership model within its own structure.

Te Akatea has two co- presidents. **Robyn Hata** deputy Principal of Te Wharekura o Rakaumangamanga in Huntly, and myself, Principal of Rhode Street School in Hamilton- we have a further seven executive members representing: main stream primary intermediate and secondary. Kura kaupapa, full emersion and rumaki

We are completely autonomist and are an incorporated society.

We are represented on the SSC, PRG, Teachers Council, NZEI Council, and various Ministry reference groups.

We are non- political but do provide a shared Maori perspective and at times commentate on issues facing or impacting on Maori in education.

Our next Annual Conference is in balmy Palmy in August From the 24th to the 26th at the Palmerston North Convention Centre.

Prof Mason Durie will open the conference as a key note speaker.

You are all most welcome to attend.

On reflection if we continue the analogy of the orchestra, I guess Te Akatea beats the drum and I like you am a groupie.

Research Award

The basic purpose of the award is to encourage and support research or projects that will develop practical assistance for schools and teachers, in developing knowledge and or class programmes of work aimed at excellence in learning for Maori students.

Over 80% of our Maori Students are enrolled in main stream schools yet more than 80% of our Maori teachers and leaders are in Kura kaupapa and full emersion.

With these two statistics in mind, Te Akatea wanted this research grant to focus on providing a resource for all schools not just Kura kaupapa to meet the needs of all Maori students.

Last year's recipient was Hoana Pearson, Tumuaki of Newton Central School Grey Lynn Auckland.

The board, Principal and staff together with the school community are committed to providing an inclusive bicultural and multicultural learning environment that celebrates and promotes the importance of **oral language** and **culture** as a foundation For students well being and learning.

Achievement information indicates that the majority of students. Particularly Maori students perform at or above national expectations in literacy and numeracy.

The principal has a coherent and clearly articulated philosophy focused on education as a means to achieve social justice.

Hoana will present her research paper at our annual conference and we will publish it on the NZPF web site

Theory without research is mere speculation: research without theory is merely data collection.

Hoana's topic is:

Partnership processes in a mainstream setting.

Her overall **aim** is to contribute to the transformation of institutional systems and culture in order to enhance achievement for Maori in mainstream settings.

Hoana's **specific objectives** are to:

- 1. Document and describe a model of governance partnership between Maori and the Bot in a mainstream setting.
- 2. Describe the process in developing and implementing the model.
- 3. Describe the impacts on leadership. Teaching and learning and potentially on achievement

How will you benefit?

This research will provide practical information for others wishing to pursue similar processes.

Hoana's model is based on her own school and what has happened since providing the opportunity for Maori and Pacifica to become more involved through a shared partnership at all levels of the schools organisation.

She challenges the deficit thinking of some traditional teaching and institutional models and offers many practical ideas to collectively engage all cultures on a journey of dynamic learning.

Hoana asks several reflective questions in her research!

What does success mean and look like for Maori?

What impact does the philosophy/ belief/ culture of the principal have on teaching and learning?

How do relationships strengthen culture?

Te Akatea looks forward to reading Hoana's final paper and sharing her findings with the sectors.
