#### Homework in the Spring

Spring is a demanding time for farmers and many need their children to help more around the farm at this time. So think about skipping homework for the Spring season. Eliminating an extra stress point for families should be well received. Run the suggestion by your BoT Chair to get their reaction. Explain in your school newsletter what you are doing and why.

#### Management release for teaching principals

Are you using your allocated staffing entitlement for managing the school? Watch that you are not 'borrowing' from this entitlement to run other programmes, or banking it to make the school more money.

In the short term this may appear a great idea, but long term consequences may be damaging to you and your school. Indications are that principals who are not fully utilising this management component are often the ones running into trouble down the track. When you squeeze out this time and use it for something else; you either don't get around to doing things you should be doing, or you end up spending every waking hour working and get tired and stressed.

Being a teaching principal is a complicated juggling act and the need to balance your week is crucial or something will give. Don't let that something be you!
